


erhaps many of you have visited the **Scottish American Memorial**, or **Scots American War Memorial**, in <u>West Princes Street Gardens</u> in Edinburgh. It was called "The Call of 1914", and was erected in 1927. The memorial was given by <u>Scottish-Americans</u> to honor Scots who had served in the <u>first World War</u>. It is well worth a visit.

But who knew that there was a memorial dedicated to Scottish Americans who made the ultimate sacrifice in defense of this country right here in Slater Park in Pawtucket? An effort is underway to renew this rare marker that recognizes the important contribution of Scottish Americans to the defense of our country. We need your help.

Following World War I, Clan Fraser established the memorial and it was later expanded to include the names of the fallen from World War II. As you may know, at the turn of the twentieth century, Pawtucket boasted the largest percentage of Scottish immigrants of any American community and that is most likely the reason for the placement. STATE OF THE SOCIETY

We're pleased to report that the state of our Society is strong. Since the last issue of the Saltire, and as mentioned elsewhere on these pages, we have held a terrific Whisky Tasting, our Annual Tartan Bash, our annual Christmas Ceilidh and have participated in a (belated) St. Andrew's Day flag raising at the Pawtucket City Hall. Moreover, our 59th Burns Supper is on the horizon on February 4, 2023!

As discussed at the Bash, 2023 will mark the 100th anniversary of the St. Andrew's Society of Rhode Island. We anticipate that it will be a memorable year, the culmination of which will be our biggest event ever. We will hold a **St. Andrew's Society 100th Anniversary Celebration** on Sunday, October 22, 2023 at the Crowne Plaza in Warwick. We're planning some extra-special entertainment and a few surprises as well. The event will be a celebration of you, our members, so we'll hope to see everyone there!

The Board voted to make our annual charitable contributions on behalf of the Society. Specifically, the Society will donate \$400 the Folio Trust in Scotland and \$100 to McAuley Ministries here in Rhode Island. In addition, we are making another \$100 donation to the wonderful Rhode Island Highlanders Pipe Band. The Board reserved the option to make supplemental and/or additional donations after the first of the year. If anyone has any questions or suggestions regarding our annual charitable donations, we encourage you to contact any of the members of the Board, whose contact information is listed below.

Longtime member Fraser Lang and his brother Duncan are spearheading an effort to raise funds for the restoration of the Scottish-American war memorial in Pawtucket. The monument lists the name of the Scottish and Scottish American residents of Pawtucket killed in the two world wars. The monument is in disrepair and the cost of restoration is estimated to be \$3,000. Toward that end, Fraser has set up a Go-FundMe page, and any and all contributions to this worthy cause will be much appreciated – click here for link.

Whisky Tasting 2022 - Scotland Forever

At long last our Society was once again able to hold one of our favorite events, the annual Whisky Tasting. The event is typically held in April, but this year was held on Sunday, October 2nd at St. Luke's Episcopal Church Hall in Pawtucket before an eager and thirsty crowd. We are fortunate indeed to have the talents of Joe Muzzy to coordinate and conduct the event each year. Joe brings both enthusiasm and a breadth of knowledge (more importantly, Joe also brings the whiskys).

This year's theme was *Scotland Forever* and the selections didn't disappoint. The first half of the afternoon's program featured a wonderful Speyside offering; Cardhu Gold Reserve, as well as a pair of fine Highland whiskys. The Singleton 18 was well received as was the Royal Brackla 18, known as "the King's own whisky" since 1833 when King William IV granted Brackla a Royal charter after falling under its spell. A brief intermission featured fruits and cheeses to cleanse the palate as well as some marvelous piping courtesy of Jack MacLean. After the intermission the focus turned to Islay for our final three tastings. Joe provided information and insight as we tasted an Ardbeg An Oa, Port Charlotte 10 and then closed the program with a Laphroig Cairdeas. For those who prefer a peaty whisky, these three were winners all.



As always, our fabulous chef in residence, Donald Blais carefully paired each whisky with just the right complement, ranging from the sweet (a mini raspberry chocolate tartlet) to the savory (haggis puffs with whisky cream sauce). Well done, Donald! We'd be remiss without thanking those who assisted in pouring, serving, and presenting; Br. Enoch Valentine, Gail Kelleher, Jim Kelleher and the master pourer herself, Nancy Muzzy. In 2023 we plan to return the event to its familiar April scheduling and intend to limit it to 25 tasters. Given what a great time was had by all, you'd be wise to keep an eye out for next year's notice and to jump on those tickets when you can!

St Andrew's Day Flag Raising by Jim Kelleher

Our Society was recently contacted and invited to participate in a wonderful St. Andrew's Day event: raising the Scottish flag at Pawtucket City Hall. It may come as a surprise to some of our readers that at one time the city of Pawtucket had the highest percentage of Scots and people of Scottish decent of any city in the United States. With a still sizeable population of Scottish Americans, Pawtucket was a natural choice to host such an event. The event was the brainchild of Patricia St. Germain, a proud Scottish American and now also a proud member of our St. Andrew's Society.

Pat reached out to me in the hope that we could supply a flag, an honor guard and a piper. Naturally we were able to do so and happy to oblige. The event was scheduled for November 30th, St. Andrew's Day, but Mother Nature decided otherwise. Pouring rain and howling winds forced a rescheduling to the following Wednesday, December 7th. As luck would have it December 7th brought more rain but rather than another postponement, it was decided to move the flag "raising" ceremony indoors (luckily Richmond Cargill was able to provide the proper size flag and staff on short notice).



Pat welcomed everyone and introduced Pawtucket Mayor Donald Grebian who welcomed us on behalf of the city. Pat then gave an address that spoke of her Scottish ancestors, their connection to Pawtucket and their new found Scottish community here in the United States. Her address was colorful, interesting and heartfelt. She then introduced our own Fraser Lang who spoke of the wonderful Scottish legacy in our state and in Pawtucket in particular. For those who have had occasion to hear him speak, it is always memorable. At the conclusion of the remarks, our wonderful Debbie Kane intoned Scotland the Brave as Richmond Cargill, myself and flag bearer Joe Muzzy brought

the Scottish flag to its place of honor. It is anticipated that this flag raising will be an annual St. Andrew's Day event, so mark your calendars!

(Cont. from Page 1) Now the City of Pawtucket has requested assistance in the restoration of the cement marker in Slater Park. There are a total of eleven men memorialized with separate plaques - three from World War I and nine from World War II. Clan Fraser was a sister organization to the Saint Andrew's Society that boasted over three hundred members in the early part of the last century. I can find no record of how the Clan Fraser funded the monument, but I would imagine that it was through an appeal to the membership. That effort took a real commitment on the part of the local Scottish American community to realize its goal. In all my travels and my web research I can identify no similar monument of a community's recognition of those of our kinsman who made the ultimate sacrifice.

The cost to restore the cement base and place a granite top bearing the two plaques is only \$3,500. The monument is placed in a prominent place opposite the Carousel in a wonderfully restored Slater Park. We are a third of the way towards our goal with \$1,200 raised to date. Pawtucket is no longer the center of a robust Scottish American population. But it boasts one of the exceedingly rare tributes to our kinsman. Recall the words of Robert Burns:

Lay the proud usurpers low!
Tyrants fall in every foe!
Liberty's in every blow!—
Let us do or die!

And now please join in honoring those brave men and reminding people of the enormous contribution that those with Scottish blood made to this country. They are:








We began our journey in Glasgow but quickly opted for the island breezes. The train to Wemyss Bay brought us to the beautiful Victorian terminal to meet the Caledonian MacBrayne ferry to the Isle of Bute to visit relatives and enjoy a stay in a lovely seaside "self-catered" cottage where we could warm our own haggis and sausages from MacQueen's Butcher Shop in Rothesay.

We highly recommend the island bus tour, a visit to Mount Stuart House complete with walks through the gardens and along the extensive shoreline there. The Glenburn Hotel also has wonderful views of the harbor and excellent service in the dining room. https://bespokehotels.com/glenburn-hotel

Glasgow Street Art

Returning to Glasgow, the <u>Kelvingrove Museum</u> set us off on a wonderful start to a voyage along the west coast and islands. The museum, free to all visitors, holds a large art collection, and excellent displays of Scottish history, furniture, artifacts and more. We enjoyed an organ recital the day we visited. Walks along the Clyde and across beautiful bridges are a pleasure as well.





Our small cruise ship took us first to Fort William where we watched the <u>Hogwarts Express</u> cross the famous Glenfinnan Viaduct and visited the monument to Bonnie Prince Charlie's Jacobite Highlanders.

Next was the Kyle of Lochalsh on the Isle of Skye where a young kilted piper welcomed us ashore for a visit to <u>Eileen Donan</u> Castle and hauntingly beautiful Glencoe.



Up the coast further we docked in Kirkwall in the Orkney Islands to visit <u>St. Magnus Cathedral</u> and learn about the many Viking connections in Scotland's history. Neolithic archeology expert <u>Nick Card</u> provided background on the <u>Ness of Brodgar</u>, dating from 3200 BC, and accompanied us to the Ring of Brodgar which was built before Stonehenge. A windy visit to the active UNESCO archeological site of <u>Skara Brae</u> brought the challenges and accomplishments of the early island peoples to light.


Our final Scottish dock was Lerwick, Isle of Skye before a night crossing of the rather choppy North Sea. Rhode Island Highlanders Pipe Band Celebrating our 75th Anniversary Year 1948 – 2023 by Debbie Kane



The Rhode Island Highlanders Pipe Band was formed after World War II, in 1948, primarily by returning veterans who were dedicated to preserving and performing the traditional music of Scotland and Ireland. The Band has continued to pursue this goal in subsequent years. We pride ourselves in the music we present and have become particularly active in teaching young students and adults so that the art of playing music on bagpipes and drums can be passed on correctly to new generations.

Three of the past influential Pipe Majors who helped shape the Band were John Everett MacLean, Alexander R. Glenn and B. John Sullivan.

During the early years, under the direction of P/M John Everett MacLean, the band toured the competition circuit with great success winning not only in the US but in Canada. In the middle years, with younger people becoming involved, the Band, under the guidance and direction of P/M Alexander R. Glen, provided a place for music primarily focusing on the recreational venue playing at parades and other events. The Band, under the direction of P/M B. John Sullivan, worked with the musicians to transform it from a recreational unit into a competitive Pipe Band of distinction with many awards and trophies to it's credit.

The Rhode Island Highlanders Pipe Band is currently under the direction of P/M Debbie Kane. Debbie has a degree in music education and learned to play bagpipes in this band. She has played continuously with the Rhode Island Highlanders since 1977 and has been serving as Pipe Major since 2005. Under her direction the Band has continued to grow in membership and to achieve success in the competition arena in both Gr. 5 and Gr. 4. Assisting in leadership are Pipe Sgt. Peter Gordon and Drum Sgt. Brad Livingston.

The band currently has a membership of 20 pipers and 16 drummers, and a growing number of students in both piping and drumming. The Rhode Island Highlanders Pipe Band is a member of the Eastern United States Pipe Band Association (EUSPBA).

In 2007 the Band was awarded the highest honor in winning the Gr. 5 overall champion in the Eastern United States Pipe Band Association. The Band was upgraded to Gr. 4 in 2008. We are continuing to place and win at various Highland Games throughout New England and New York. Currently, we are presenting two competition level groups within the Band, Gr. 5 and Gr. 4, The entire band, including both competitive groups, participate in all other non-competitive performances such as parades and other special events.

We are anticipating a very successful upcoming year with our parade and event performances in addition to our exciting full competition season with both Gr. 5 and Gr. 4 groups as we celebrate 2023 and our 75th Jubilee Year.



As a band, we work together to achieve our goals which are: to proudly come together to play Pipe Band music competitively to the best of our ability to participate and enjoy the thrill of playing at Highland Games not only as soloists but also in the Band environment; to offer our musical services to the community in the form of parades and events; to continue to improve, grow and teach the musical art of Piping and Drumming; to enjoy and share our music and our friendship.

We always welcome visitors at any practice to come in and enjoy our rehearsal. We also invite and pipers or drummers who are interested in joining the Band to come in and experience our structured practice. 
Curling at the Jealous Monk by Jim Kelleher



Our afternoon began with a Cragellachie 13, a sweet but slightly smoky Speyside offering. This was followed by a pair of Highland whiskys. We sampled a Glengoyne 12, a bit of a fruity palate with a long lingering finish. The first half of the program closed with a marvelous Aberfeldy 12, a Highland noted for its bright, sweet and silky notes. During our intermission we were treated to wonderful piping, courtesy of Jack MacLean.

Our program then continued with three excellent offerings from Islay. Bunnahabhain 12 provided an earthy, spicy taste with a long fruity finish. We followed that with Kllchoman Machir Bay, a warm and zesty surprise. Despite the absence of an age statement, it was clear that this was a mature and complex dram. We concluded the day's offerings with a Lagavulin 11 Offerman, the most-peaty of all of the day's whiskys and a real winner. As always, our resident chef, Donald Blais, out did himself with perfect pairing ranging from sweet to savory. Each was a gem and enhanced the experience immensely. Kudos to Donald!

In addition to our invaluable whisky guru, Joe Muzzy, the Whisky Tasting was made possible by the assistance of Enoch Valentine, Gail Kelleher, Jim Kelleher and the queen of the perfect pour, Nancy Muzzy.



A Vacation in Newfoundland with Some Scottish Connections by John Topping

SASRI long time members John and Fran Topping recently took a vacation in Newfoundland, Canada from Rhode Island. They drove to North Sidney in Nova Scotia to take the 7-hour day-time ferry.

Our first surprise in entering Nova Scotia was to see that their provincial flag was a Saltire. Our second surprise was related to the easternmost end of Nova Scotia: a beautiful area called Cape Breton around which goes the world-famous Cabot Trail. If this is not on your list of places to go it should be. Not only is it stunningly beautiful it has its own tartan.





When we did get to Newfoundland, we found that it has a tartan also:



You may remember from your school geography classes that Newfoundland is a large island off the east coast of Canada. It is about 50% larger than Scotland so in the 2 weeks that we were there we just toured the western half.

From Rhode Island we drove through Maine and into New Brunswick where we stopped at the Bay of Fundy to see the many thousands of shorebirds (particularly sandpipers) that stop there to "refuel" during migration. When we were there the nature people there estimated that there were 50,000 of them ... amazing to see!





We arrived in Newfoundland and spent the night at a town called Port aux Basques. There is quite a French influence there from the early settlers being both English and French. The next day we visited a lovely coastal nature preserve called the Codroy Valley where we hiked a beach trail, then viewed a nice old lighthouse at Cape Anguille, then we drove further north to a nice old inn called the Glyn Mills Inn.

We drove further north to a nice small coastal town called Corner Brook where we stayed at another nice old inn. Then further north to a town called Rocky Harbour where we stayed 4 nights in a very nice holiday cottage/cabin. From there, we visited a large nearby National Park called Gros Morne that included an inland freshwater fjord. We took a 2-hour boat tour up and back; very scenic. Fran saw a quick glimpse of a black bear but I missed it. Another day we visited an interpretive center on the geology of the park, very interesting as the study of this had influenced the development of the theory of tectonic plates and their movements in continental drift. A visit to a museum of wildlife ended the day.





Driving further north, we stopped by a rock formation on the beach of a series of rock arches ... and shortly after that we saw a moose by the roadside. Then onto our next nice cabin at the very top of the peninsula at a very small town called Raleigh. Near to there was a nature preserve called Burnt Cape. It is a limestone "barrens", very rocky, but somehow small flowering plants manage to grow there which were of great interest to Fran. Nearby is a model of a Viking settlement on the site where archaeological excavations have yielded quite a number of Viking artifacts. It is thought that this was the first place in North America discovered by Europeans. There was also a museum to the memory of an English doctor (Dr. Wilfred Grenfell) who spent his career providing healthcare to the fishermen and their families in the 1890's and early 1900's. He was knighted for his efforts and successes. Finally, from the northernmost tip we saw on the far horizon three icebergs floating south from calving off the Greenland ice shield.

Our last stop was a small town called Twillingate on an island where there is more very beautiful coastal scenery, again another very nice cabin to stay in. Then back the way that we came ... all in all a fantastic holiday. Cheers!

"Not Apple" Dessert

CRUST & TOPPING:	FILLING:
4 cups all-purpose flour 2 cups sugar 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon salt 1-1/2 cups cold butter or margarine	8 to 10 cups cubed seeded peeled zucchini (4 to 5 pounds) 2/3 cup lemon juice 1 cup sugar 1 teaspoon ground cinnamon 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg

In a bowl, combine flour, sugar, cinnamon and salt. Cut in butter until crumbly; reserve 3 cups.

Pat remaining crumb mixture into the bottom of a greased 13-in. x 9-in. × 2-in. baking pan. Bake at 375° for 12 minutes. Meanwhile, for filling, place zucchini and lemon juice in a saucepan; bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cover and cook for 6-8 minutes or until zucchini is crisp-tender.

Stir in sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg; cover and simmer for 5 minutes (mixture will be thin). Spoon over crust; sprinkle with the reserved crumb mixture. Bake at 375° for 40-45 minutes or until golden.

Yield: 16-20 servings. [Zucchini Dessert Squares]
