



Revisions to By-Laws

At the October 2017 meeting of the Board of Directors, the Board unanimously voted to adopt significant revisions to the by-laws of the St. Andrew's Society of Rhode Island. The complete by-laws, as revised, are available for viewing on the website under the Membership tab, but the highlights of the revisions are as follows:

The **classes of membership** in our organization have been streamlined, and now consist of General Members, Life Members and Honorary Members. We eliminated a distinct class for members not of Scottish decent, and we limited the life member class to those persons presently in that class. Going forward all members will be general members and thereby eligible to vote, hold office and serve on the Board of Directors. Honorary members will have the same rights but will no longer pay dues.

The **term of membership to the Board of Directors** will now be set at a five year term with no limitation on the number of terms a member may serve. When a Board member's term expires, his or her seat will be up for election at the next Annual Meeting. As described on page 7, two such seats on the Board will be elected at the upcoming Annual Meeting in March.

The **offices of the Society** have been reformed as well. We have eliminated the position of President (which has been vacant for a number of years) and Vice President. A new position has been created entitled **Events Manager**. The position is currently vacant (please see the State of the Society article on Page 4.) The Board has appointed Cathy Poirier to serve as Secretary, Gail Kelleher as Treasurer, Shirley Loiselle as Membership Chair, and Joseph Muzzy, Patty Pereira and Gail Kelleher to serve as the Social Media Committee. The Social Media Committee is responsible for maintenance and updating of the SASRI website and Facebook page as well as publication of the Saltire. In addition, the Social Media Committee will be responsible for community outreach as appropriate.



The Tartan Bash continues to be a smash success!

The Imperial Room in Cranston, RI was the selected site once again for this annual event. Beautifully decorated with various tartans displayed throughout the room, the royal blue bows on the chairs coordinated nicely with the many representations of the Society's own tartan colors, and added a very festive feel to the room. Steve Venuti artfully performed the duties of Master of Ceremonies, carefully guiding the guests through the evening's activities of dinner, dancing, and entertainment.

Waltzing and reeling the night away to the tunes of the Irish Express, the eighty guests kept to the dance floor for most of the evening. The band gratefully noted their appreciation of all the dancing, and to Kristen Howe who led the dancers in the Scottish country dance numbers.

Piper and Society member Debbie Kane and drummer Norman McLeod further enhanced the musical portion of the evening by performing a selection of Scottish tunes, including several especially loved tunes that are always requested by long-time members.

Newcomers to the event were enthralled with David Ward's Address to a Haggis, many not having seen it performed. For the newly initiated to the tradition, a translation of the poem was made available at several of the tables so that guests could follow along. The Society is grateful for David's continuing participation in the traditional Address.

A highlight of the evening was the recognition of Virginia Butler as having been the Society's treasurer for 17 years! John MacLean presented Virginia with a plaque noting the Society's appreciation for her efforts and dedication, and Richmond Cargill presented a bouquet of flowers. In honor of her years of service, Virginia was designated a lifetime Honorary Membership in the Society. Congratulations, Virginia!

As always, the evening concluded with all guests in a circle, holding hands, singing Auld Lang Syne, as we remembered all those near and far whom we hold in our hearts.

Christmas came early for members of the St. Andrew's Society – Our annual Christmas Cèilidh festivities were held December 2 at the American Legion Auburn Post. Members brought their favorite dishes to share and by all reports the food was delicious! The hall was beautifully decorated putting everyone in the spirit of the season.

In addition to sharing a meal with friends, those present were treated to musical performances by several of our members. And what would a Christmas Cèilidh be without cèilidh dancing? Many of our members joined in dancing the Reel of the 51st and several other favorites.

Most importantly, those who attended shared the Christmas spirit by bringing bags of canned good to support the First Baptist Church in Pawtucket. They were so thankful for the food as they serve approximately 150 families per month. Thank you for helping to make this night a success!


GOOD SCOTTISH READS











Looking for a Good Book?

Winter is here! It's time to grab a glass of your favorite libation, curl up in front of the fire, and lose yourself in a great story. Here are some great choices, old and new:

Recently voted best Scottish book of all time: **Sunset Song**, by Lewis Grassic Gibbon. Sunset Song remains a classic across the land. What young woman wouldn't identify with its heroine, Chris Guthrie, torn between the countryside of her birth and the modern world?

Murder Mystery: <u>Driftnet</u>, by Lin Anderson. This crime book has flown off shelves. When a teenage boy is found murdered in a Glasgow flat, forensic psychologist Rhona MacLeod finds likenesses between herself and the victim. Could he be the son she put up for adoption 17 years before?


A Lyrical Read: <u>Buddha Da</u>, by Anne Donovan. This beautiful novel won rave reviews when first published three years ago. Though written entirely in Glaswegian Scots, it is an easy and lyrical read about a decorator who becomes a Buddhist, and is one of Canongate's selection for the Scottish exhibition.

A Classic: <u>Waverley</u>, by Sir Walter Scott. For tourists who have arrived at Waverley station and visited the Scott Monument, this is the real thing. The story of the Jacobite uprising of 1745 and the idealistic young Edward Waverley, drawn in to Bonnie Prince Charlie's web. A classic of classics.

Horror: <u>The Wasp Factory</u>, by Iain Banks. Dark, detached and brilliant, Iain Banks' first novel remains his finest. Frank is a teenager on a remote Scottish island whose strange obsessions, and the varying degrees of insanity of his family members, become increasingly horrifying. Makes Stephen King look like Beatrix Potter.

Mysterious & Tragic: <u>The Cone Gatherers</u>, by Robin Jenkins. Scotland's Of Mice and Men, Robin Jenkins' haunting novel is set during the Second World War on a Scottish country estate and tells the story of two brothers working as cone gatherers. Mysterious and tragic, it remains a classic moral tale.


55th ANNUAL BURNS SUPPER

The freezing temperature and biting wind did not deter the 250 guests at Rhodes on the Pawtuxet from celebrating the birthday of Scotland's Poet Laureate. The decorations turned the early 20th Century ballroom into an homage to Robert Burns. The stage was festooned with tartan, and the Bard himself gazed down on the crowd from the top of the upper gallery. Each table was covered in white linen and a beautiful centerpiece, coordinated with this year's pin, adorned each table. The room was set for a lovely evening, and what an evening it was!

Master of Ceremonies Stephen Venuti welcomed everyone and invited Board Members G. Richmond Cargill, Shirley Loiselle and John C. MacLean to toast the President, Her Majesty the Queen and the guest of honor, Robert Burns. Brother Enoch John read *The Grace Before Meal* and as dinner was being served the haggis was piped in by John MacLean Jr., accompanied by Richmond Cargill, Ian MacLean and Joe Muzzy bearing the gifts: Whisky, Haggis and Sword. John MacLean delivered the Address to a Haggis perfectly and with plenty of heart – by the way, John makes the ceremonial haggis every year! Guests dined on scotch broth, salad, short ribs and 'neeps & tatties' while watching the events of the evening.

After dinner, the traditions continued. Brother Enoch remembered the Flowers of the Forest, and Catherine MacLean gave a very personal Immortal Memory – fondly speaking of how special the Burns Suppers she attended throughout her childhood were to her, and how it impacted her as a child and as an adult. Catherine, you did your family proud! The dinner concluded with delicious Apple Pie ala Mode. The revelers were treated to beautiful vocal performances by Brother Enoch and Mr. Donald Blais, and as always, finished with *The Star of Rabbie Burns* with the audience joining enthusiastically in the chorus. The Rhode Island Highlanders next took to the floor and dazzled the crowd, led by Pipe Major Debbie Kane as well as a drum solo by Norman McLeod. The Highlanders stayed in perfect formation throughout their performance and no one was disappointed. Well done!

The evening finished with plenty of Ceilidh dancing to the music of the Irish Express. The dance floor was filled with beginner dancers as well as seasoned veterans of all ages. Kristen Howe called the dances, and there was nary a rest for the next two hours. But all good things must come to an end – everyone joined in the singing of Auld Lang Syne with hands clasped, voices raised, and hearts filled with the warmth and friendship of the evening.





2017 CLAN MACLEAN GATHERING

Over 750 MacLean's from across the world attended the Gathering of the Clan on June 20-25 last year. The full event comprised almost a week of activities on the Isle of Mull allowing visitors to connect to their shared heritage and the bounty the ancestral lands of the clan has to offer. It culminated in the Gathering event at Duart Castle on June 24, where visitors enjoyed tours of the castle, cultural entertainment from local performers, food from local vendors, and a mass procession and group photo to commemorate the event. The cultural en-

tertainment included the award-winning Gaelic choir of the Isle of Mull, and the Tobermory School children's Gaelic choir, the clan Chief's official piper, and a demonstration of the proper way to wear a belted plaid, in addition to piping from the Mull and Iona Pipe band, and traditional Scottish dancing by local students. The weather was Scottish as ever, with moments of sun breaking through clouds, followed swiftly by rain, only to repeat the cycle again. Despite moments of tempest, the day was enjoyed by all. That night, the assembled MacLeans crowded into a marquee on the grounds of Tobermory High School and participated in Scottish country dancing. Young and old, experienced and novice, from many countries around the world, all joined in on the dance floor in their finest kilts to kick up their heels long into the evening.

Earlier in the week, boat tours to the nearby islands were available to visitors, allowing them to explore the historic abbey at Iona and the legendary Fingal's Cave and puffin colonies on Staffa and Treshnish. A whiskey tasting was held one evening, allowing attendees to sample a variety of versions of this most Scottish liquor. The marquee was put to great use for a ceilidh on Friday night, featuring performances from the Mull Gaelic choir, including solos by award-winning members, as well as many other local artists. In addition to all of this, genealogists were available for those seek-



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ing more information about their family history, and the shops, museums, and scenery of Tobermory and the entire island were available for MacLean's to explore and enjoy.

A critical focus of the Gathering this year was the campaign to restore Duart Castle. Opportunities abounded to hear about the work being done to repair and preserve the stone façade of the castle, which has suffered after years of weather, wear, and tear. Many took the opportunity to donate to the Heritage Trust, and contribute to the project. Upon visiting the castle, this writer and her family had the opportunity to converse with the masons already at work on the castle, and to hear about the great care and expertise they brought to bear on the project to ensure the castle can stand strong for centuries more.

The immersion in the peaceful island life combined with the celebration of bringing the clan together yet again created a fantastic atmosphere. Upon recognizing each other's green nametags, clansmen were apt to strike up conversations, inquiring about each other's place of origin and connections to the clan. Sharing a common love of Scottish heritage.

Singing together on a hill beneath the castle with hundreds of relatives I had never met was an experience this writer won't soon forget. Here's hoping the next Gathering brings similar joy and connection for this strong and fiercely loyal Clan.







WHISKY TASTING 2018

If you missed the whisky tasting this past April, you missed the best one yet! Joe Muzzy and Stephen Venuti outdid themselves in "**Revisiting the Regions**", presenting whiskys from the Lowland region, Speyside, the Highland region, Orkney and Islay. Each one a quality whisky with exceptional taste, Joe and Stephen shared their knowledge as they spoke to the nose, palate, and finish of each one, thus enhancing the experience of the 37 tasters. This year's event featured these whiskys. (see below)

Selected food pairings, largely recommended by the distilleries, were prepared by St Andrew's Society member Donald Blais. Surprising everyone, Donald began the pairings with a sweet treat, which fully complemented the selected whisky. Each tasting was accompanied by such tasty morsels as stuffed potatoes, beef bourguignon bites and of course, the ever popular haggis puffs!

The foodie hit of the event was the Cullen Skink – a thick Scottish soup made of smoked haddock, potatoes and onions. (Kudos to Donald Blais – he smoked the haddock himself!) It was quite a delicious surprise for all of the attendees, including the 15 non-tasters.

Many thanks to Brother Enoch Valentine for facilitating the event at a new venue, St Luke's Episcopal Church in Pawtucket. The larger seating area allowed for expanding the tasting to more folks, and the full kitchen facilities enabled Donald to be creative in his food pairings.

Thanks also to the many St Andrew's Society members who assisted in preparing and serving, (and cleaning up!) and to Nancy Muzzy for assisting Joe and Stephen with the pouring.

Donald Ross' Legacy to Rhode Island


Many people know that the game of golf originated in Scotland, but fewer know of the significant Rhode Island connection to one of golf's legends: Donald Ross.

Donald Ross was born in 1872 near Dornoch in Sutherland. As a young man he honed his skills as a player as well as a greenkeeper on the famed Royal Dornoch course . He managed to land an apprenticeship at golf's holiest of shrines, St. Andrew's. An American benefactor persuaded young Ross to come to the United States and help the game reach new heights. He quickly made his fame in America by designing the legendary Pinehurst 2 in North Carolina along with many others. He became fond of summering in New England and the demand for his skills became such that he opened a summer office in Little Compton, Rhode Island from which he and his company oversaw construction of numerous courses throughout New England.

Until his death in 1948, Donald Ross designed and oversaw construction of some 413 championship golf courses throughout the United States, and is universally acclaimed as the greatest course designer in the history of the sport. Owing to his years spent in the Ocean State, Rhode Island is proud to boast no less than ten Donald Ross courses. They are:

ALL ROADS LEAD TOSCOTLAND ?

We recently had the opportunity to travel to Italy, a glorious country that rivals Scotland in its beauty. Needless to say, Italy features countless museums and we certainly visited many of them. In the ancient city of Perugia, we noticed this pre-Renaissance painting created some 650 years ago. While the painting itself is interesting, we were fascinated by the detail in the lower right hand corner which depicts cattle swaying and a dog merrily dancing to... a bagpiper! We know that the Roman Empire once stretched all the way to the southern reaches of present day Scotland, so we can only speculate as to whether the Romans may have encountered Scottish pipers and then introduced the instrument into the Italian culture. In any event, it's clear from the painting that the Perugian dog loved the lilt o' the pipes.

Nearly any visit to Rome will include a tour of the Vatican Museum and St. Peter's Basilica. If you ever find yourself strolling through St. Peter's, be sure to pause at this monument.

Created by the famous 19th Century sculptor Antonio Canova, this beautiful monument marks the spot below which are buried the remains of none other than James VIII, the exiled "King Over The Water",





his younger son Henry (a Roman Catholic cardinal) along with James' older son Charles, the Bonnie Prince himself. James VIII left Scotland at six months old when his father King James VII was deposed from the British throne. James VIII lived the remainder of his life in exile in France and Italy. As we know, Bonnie Prince Charlie made one brief and ill-fated trip to Scotland in an attempt to return his family to the throne. That effort ended with the Battle of Culloden in 1746 and Charles then fleeing to France, never to return. In death, father and son (and Cardinal Henry) are reunited in St. Peter's Basilica, the final resting place of the House of Stuart.
